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### And when scary animals came to play,




the mountain would tell the animals to be nice, otherwise they could not stay.

This page can have a page number, but the author page that follows shouldn't.

You can also include photographs or other images on this page if it makes it more meaningful, or leave it out altogether if your story needs this amount of room.
